

U.K. Places to Visit

A. In the Life of John Milton

1. The Milton Church, near Abingdon, in Oxfordshire, where Milton's family came from.

2. London, Cheapside, Bread Street, birthplace of Jn. Milton, Dec. 9, 1608.

✓ 3. Christ's College, Cambridge Univ, Apr. 9, 1625-, B.A. Mar. 26, 1629; M.A. July 3, 1632.

1632-1635-Res. at Hammersmith, Middlesex
4. Horton, his father's estate, near enough to London so the younger Jn. M. could go into the metropolis whenever he wished. He was there from Aug. 1635 - Apr. 1638: *Horton, Buckinghamshire*

→ 5. London, St. Bride's Churchyard, at the house of one Russel, a tailor; in Aldersgate Street; soon after his return from the Continent, July 1639, where he began to teach *(or early 1640)*.

6. M., in an autobiographical portion of his Second Defense of the English People, wrote that "as soon as I was able, I hired a spacious house in the city for myself and my books." Was this the house in Aldersgate Street?

✓ → 7. From ^{Oct.} 1645-1647 he lived in a house in the Barbican, London.

8. He moved to a smaller house in High Holborn in 1647.

→ 9. On Mar. 15, 1649 he was appointed Latin Secretary to the Council of State in the Commonwealth government, and was ^{assigned pay} given chambers in Whitehall ^(June 1650) he was deprived of them in 1652, and

10... moved to "a pretty garden-house in Petty Fraunce, Westminster, where he lived for 8 yrs, next door to the Lord Scudamore's, and opening into St. James's Park (1652-1660). Here his first and second wife died, and he finally lost his sight in his only good eye.

11. At the Restoration in 1660 M. was hidden in a friend's house in Bartholomew Close.

1661-1663-Res. in Jewin St

12. In 1663 he moved with his 3rd wife Elizabeth (30 yrs. younger than he) to a house in Artillery Walk, Bunhill Fields, to his death in 1674. While here he wrote, finished, and published his three greatest works.

(June (?) 1665 - Feb. (?) 1666)

✓ 13. For a short time during the plague of 1665 M. lived at Chalfont St. Giles, Buckinghamshire, in a house which is still preserved. (or was in 1926 and 1946).

(Nov. 12)

✓ 14. Milton died Nov. 8, 1674, and was buried in St. Giles, Cripplegate, beside his father.

B. In Baptist History:

1. NOTTINGHAM -

Where Wm. Carey preached on Isa. 54:2,3, on foreign missions, May 31, 1792.

2. BEDFORD and Bedfordshire -

Where Jn. Bunyan was imprisoned 12 years.

Elstow Church where J.B. was baptized as an infant. In Bedford is St. John's Church (Independent) which JB joined in 1653.

On Nov. 12, 1660 JB was arrested at a hamlet in Bedfordshire just as he was about to begin to preach as a deacon of his church.

For the next 12 yrs he was a prisoner in the county jail of Bedford, but with freedom to write some. He pub. Grace Abounding in 1666.

The Bunyan Meeting House at Bedford now stands on the old site of the Josias Ruffhead house or barn in an orchard, which was conveyed to Bunyan and his congregation in Aut. 1672.

JB was released and imprisoned shortly afterward, toward the end of 1675 until the Spring of the following year, in the town jail of Bedford, on the bridge over the Ouse.

He died Aug. 31, 1688, just ten weeks before William of Orange landed in England, and he was buried in Bunhill Fields, near where John Milton lived.

3. KETTERICK -

Fuller Baptist Church, where there is the tea pot used by leaders of the early Baptist Missionary Society of England as they met and prayed for missions.

4. STRATFORD-ON-AVON -

Shakespeare's home.

7. Cambridge Univ. Library -

Look for originals of John Milton's handwriting and
original edns of his works.

Look for work of Brooke Foss Wescott (1825-1901)
Professor of Divinity at Cambridge and afterward
Bishop of Durham (1890-1901) and F. J. A. Hort
(1828-1892) Professor of Divinity at Cambridge, who
worked together 29 yrs. at restoring the original
Greek of the NT.

Gr. Ms of the Epistles and Acts, Bezae: "D" (#05)
Cantabrigiensis, from the 6th cent is here too, as
well as several other Gr. NT fragments. (over)
